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MESSAGE



Assalamu Alaykum Wa Rahmatullahi Ta'ala Wa Barakatuh.

Four years have passed since the birth of the Bangsamoro Government. We, in the Ministry of Finance and Budget and Management (MFBM), remain focused on the relentless pursuit of a sound, efficient, and responsive fiscal management and utilization of resources. To achieve this, annually, we work to come up with a meticulously planned budget. This financial plan of the Government manifests the sound planning of our government operations, taking into account the efficient use of resources, and ensuring it is effective to achieve the targeted outcomes for progress for the given year.

For the past three years, the Bangsamoro Budgets have been instrumental in pursuing genuine peace and order and sustained socio-economic development for the region. We have the numbers from reports issued by the Philippine Statistics Authority to support our claim. When the world has gone stand still during 2020, the level of economic performance in every region in the country plummeted. According to PSA, BARMM posted the smallest decline of -1.9 percent. By 2021, when economic activities resumed under the New Normal, BARMM's economic performance increased by 7.5%, recording the second fastest growth among all regions in the country. These numbers of economic growth must have a trickle-down effect to the people from the grassroots for it to be inclusive. From a poverty incidence

of 55.9% from 2018, the rate decreased to 39.4% during 2021. These wins for our region should be sustained by coming up with good plans by way of sound budget to ensure continuous progress this 2023.

This budget is by the people and for the people of the Bangsamoro Autonomous Region. As such, high regard for accountability and transparency must be given. To uphold this, and also to promote public participation in the pursuit of Moral Governance, the Ministry issues the al Mizaniyyah – the magazine that narrates the salient points of the Bangsamoro Budget, otherwise known as the General Appropriations Act of the Bangsamoro (GAAB).

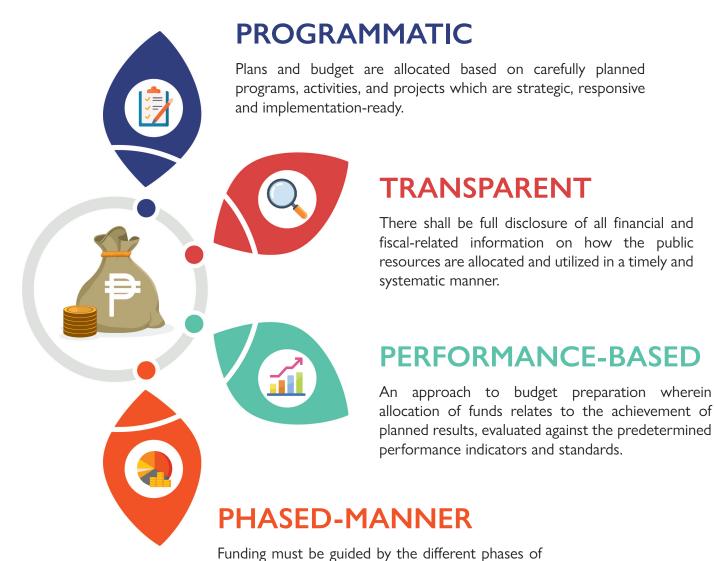

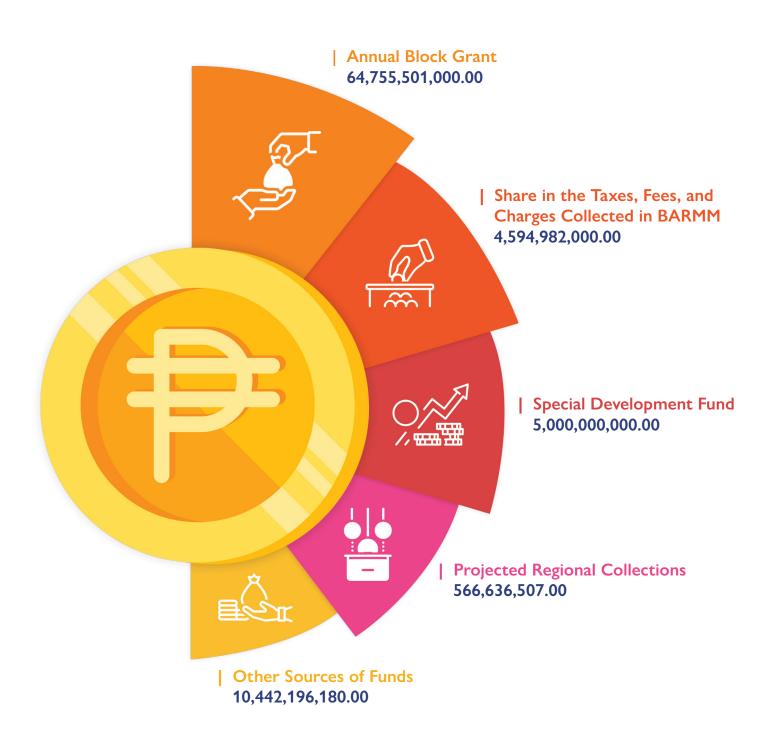

SOURCES OF FUNDS



Annual Block Grant

The annual block grant substantially covers the total funding requirement of the Bangsamoro Government. As per 2023 Bangsamoro Budget, the National Government appropriated Php64.755 Billion for this year's annual block grant. This is equated to five percent (5%) of the net national internal revenue tax collection of the Bureau of Internal Revenue (BIR) and the net collection of the Bureau of Customs (BOC) from the third fiscal year immediately preceding the current fiscal year.

The annual block grant composes 75.86% of the total fund sources of the Bangsamoro Budget. Notably, there has been a consistent decrease of the annual block grant beginning in the fiscal year (FY) 2021. There are two factors which contribute to the decrease in FY 2023 annual block grant. First, is the impact of the implementation of the Mandanas-Garcia Ruling of the Supreme Court which had the effect of increasing the amounts to be earmarked for the national tax allocation (NTA) of the LGUs, which consequently decreases the base of national income from which the annual block grant of BARMM is computed. Second, the annual block grant for FY2023 is based on the amount of revenue collected during the year 2020 which is incredibly low due to the COVID-19 pandemic.

Share in the Taxes, Fees, and Charges Collected in BARMM

One of the fund sources received from the National Government through the NEP is the National Government region's share in taxes, fees, and charges collected in the Bangsamoro Autonomous Region, other than tariff and customs duties. This is allocated between the National Government (25%) and the Bangsamoro Government (75%), provided that for the first ten (10) years following the effectivity of the BOL, the National Government's share shall accrue to the Bangsamoro Government as provided in Section 10(a), Article XII of the R.A. No. 11054.

For FY 2023, the Budget has appropriated a total of Php4.594 Billion for the Share of the Bangsamoro Government in the taxes, fees, and charges collected in the Bangsamoro Autonomous Region inclusive of the shares of the Constituent LGUs.

Special Development Fund

The Bangsamoro Government shall continue to receive funding support from the National Government to intensify development efforts for the rehabilitation, reconstruction, and development of the Bangsamoro Autonomous Region as part of the normalization process. For FY 2023, the Special Development Fund is equivalent to Php5 Billion. This shall continue to be appropriated to the Bangsamoro Government until 2029 as provided under Section 2, Art. XIV of R.A. No. 11054.

Projected Regional Collections

The sources of funds for the BEP are not limited to the funds proposed by the National Government, the Bangsamoro Government also includes in its sources of funds the projected regional revenue collected within the Bangsamoro Autonomous Region through enabling laws afforded thereto. The Bangsamoro Treasury Office (BTO) certifies a projected collection of at least Php566 Million of tax and non-tax revenues from the various Ministries and Offices in the BARMM which are lawfully authorized to collect.

Other Sources of Funds

The COVID-19 pandemic has undeniably impacted the Bangsamoro Government in public service delivery, but mostly on the establishment of the bureaucracy. As an aftereffect of the hampered hiring process, the Bangsamoro Government was able to set aside Php10 Billion from the Personnel Services of the FY 2020 Bangsamoro Appropriations Act. This is now prudently included as an additional source of funds for the FY 2023, guided by the principle stated in Section 19 (2), Article XII of the R.A. No. 11054.

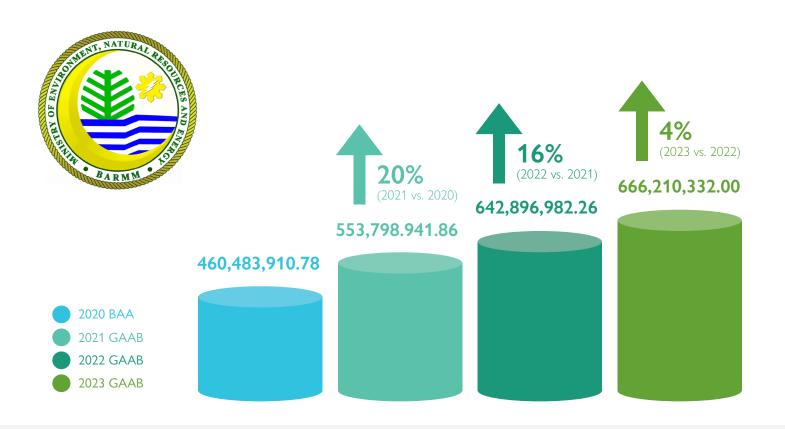
Further, the FY 2020 Bangsamoro Appropriations Act was effectively extended by the enactment of Bangsamoro Autonomy Act No. 14. However, this extension of appropriation only covers Maintenance and Other Operating Expenses (MOOE) and selected Capital Outlays (CO) for the Service Delivery Inputs of the Ministries and Offices budgets in the Operations Cost Structure. This leaves all other items not extended subject for the reversion to the Bangsamoro Treasury. The amounts reverted for this purpose will be included in the FY 2023's fund sources amounting to Php442 Million. Thus, the total amount for FY 2020 Appropriations savings is Php10.442 Billion.

General Appropriations Act of the BANGSAMORO

BY TRADITIONAL



Social Services

The Bangsamoro Government provides the highest bulk of the budget to the Social Services Sector with Php37.275 billion. Programs highly prioritized under this sector are Education, Culture, and Manpower Development; Subsidy to Local Government Units (LGUs); Social Security, Welfare and Employment; and Health.

General Public Services

The General Public Services receives the second highest budget with Php27.812 billion which comprises efforts to ensure public order and safety including law enforcement, maintenance of public order, and political administration; and general administration such as general government, fiscal affairs, civil service and lawmaking functions.

Economic Services

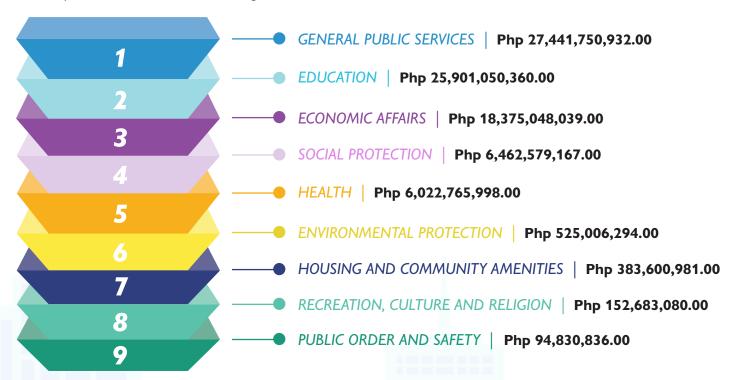
This Sector aims to fund interventions on communications, roads, and transportation facilities; agriculture, agrarian reform and natural resources; water resources development and flood control; trade and industry; power and energy; and tourism which has a budget of Php20.020 billion.

Peace and Stability

As enablers of socioeconomic development, the Peace and Stability sector focuses its efforts on promoting peaceful and inclusive Bangsamoro society for sustainable development with access to justice and build effective and accountable institutions. This Sector has a total budget of Php250 million.

BY COFOG

The Bangsamoro Government adopts the Classification of the Functions of Government (COFOG) System that breaks down 2023 expenditures into nine (9) major sectors according to the different purposes in which the funds are used, namely; Education, General Public Services; Economic Affairs; Social Protection; Housing and Community Amenities; Health; Environmental Protection; Public Order and Safety; and Recreation, Culture, and Religion.



General Public Services

This represents expenditures for general administration such as lawmaking, fiscal management, foreign affairs, governance, and other regulatory services.

Education

This covers pre-primary and primary education, secondary and tertiary education, and school buildings, among others.

Economic Affairs

This includes the allocations for the government's activities that promote economic growth, competitiveness of industries, and job creation.

Social Protection

This refers to government welfare spending that protects individuals from loss or interruption of income and for special expenditures due to birth, marriage, or death.

Public Order and Safety

This includes allocations for police and fire protection services, law courts, and prisons.

Health

This covers expenditures for hospitals, outpatient and public health services, health insurance, and research and development on health.

Environmental Protection

This covers expenditures for waste management, pollution control and abatement, protection of biodiversity and landscape, among others.

Housing and Community Amenities

These are housing benefits and provisions for community amenities such as potable water supply and street lighting.

Recreation, Culture and Religion

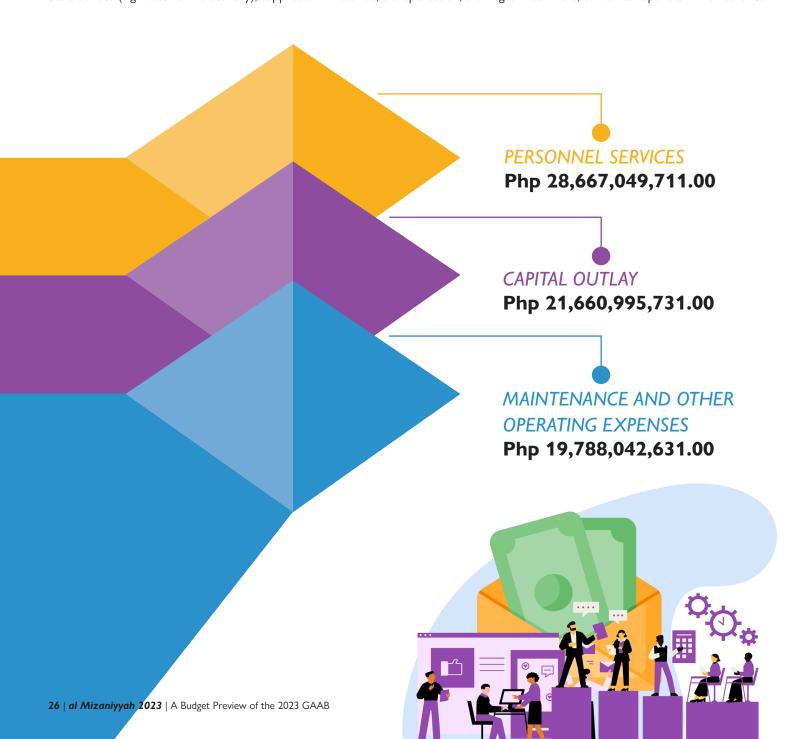
These are expenditures for services focused on recreation and sports, culture, publishing, and religion, among others.

BY EXPENSE CLASS

Based on the total FY 2023 GAAB, the largest chunk goes to Personnel Services (PS) amounting to Php 28,667,049,711.00 as payment for salaries, benefits, allowances, and other compensation of government officials and employees.

A total of Php21,657,995,731.00 is allotted to the Capital Outlay (CO) to cover the fixed assets, and infrastructure outlays such as the construction of roads, bridges, schools, and hospitals.

In Maintenance and Other Operating Expenses (MOOE), an amount of Php19,791,042,631.20 is set to support the day-to-day operations and functions of the Bangsamoro Autonomous Government. Also included in this amount are the Ministries' and Offices' expenses for basic utilities (e.g. water and electricity), supplies and materials, transportation, training and seminars, as well as repairs and maintenance.

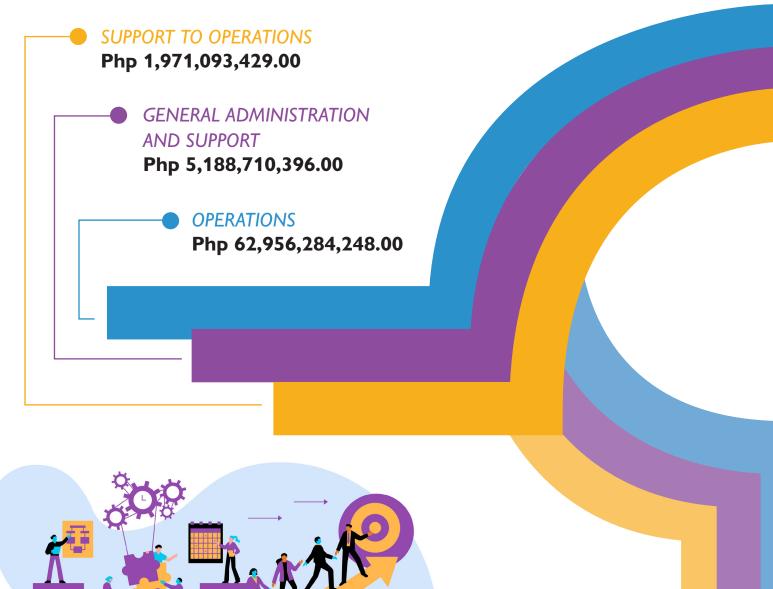


BY COST STRUCTURE

The BARMM fiscal spending is classified into three (3) cost structures namely General Administration and Support (GAS), Support to Operations (STO), and Operations.

In 2023, the Bangsamoro Government allocates a grand amount of Php62.956 billion for the Operations. This covers regular activities directly addressing the Ministries' and Offices' mandates which include purchase of goods and services for the day-to-day operations; delivery of public services; conduct of basic governance; or provision of general management and supervision of the entire Bangsamoro Government.

Expenditures for General Administration and Support (GAS) has an allocation of Php5.188 billion which represents those that are normally considered as Ministry/Office overhead including the cost of general supervision. Examples of expenditures for general administration and support are those spent for general management and supervision, human resources development, and for productivity incentive benefits. For the Support to Operations (STO) which amounts to Php1.971 billion is allocated to activities that facilitate the performance of the Ministries' or Offices' mandated functions and services. Examples of expenditures under this category are those that are meant for policy formulation and planning services; for program/project coordination, monitoring and evaluation; and for information management support system.

- 1. Refer to an expenditure category/expense class for support to the operations of government agencies such as expenses for supplies and materials; transportation and travel; utilities (water, power, etc.) and the repairs, etc.
- 2. Refers to a classification under an allotment class, based on type of goods or services consistent with COA Government Accounting Manual (GAM) and Unified Accounts Code Structure (UACS) Manual.
- 3. Refer to an expenditure category/expense class for the purchase of goods and services, the benefits of which extend beyond the fiscal year and which add to the assets of the Government, including investments in the capital stock of GOCCs and their subsidiaries.
- 4. The available funding that the government could use for its priority programs. It is computed as the difference of projected obligations ceilings (after considering projected revenues and deficit targets) and forward estimates of the cost of ongoing programs.
- 5. Authorization issued by the Department of Budget and Management (DBM) to an agency, permitting the agency to commit/incur obligation and/or pay out funds within a specified period of time within the amount specified through the: General Appropriations Act as an Allotment Order, General Allotment Release Order or Special Allotment Release Order.

DOWN:

- 6. A cost component of an agency budget which consists of activities and projects which provide staff, technical, and/or substantial support to operations, but do not produce goods or deliver services directed at a target population or client group external to the agency. This also includes expenditures that are indivisible across programs.
- 7. An authorization pursuant to laws or other legislative enactment, hence, required Congressional action, directing the spending of public funds for a specific purpose, up to a specified amount under specified conditions.
- 8. Refers to a decrease in net worth resulting from a transaction, either a decrease in assets or an increase in liabilities.
- 9. A commitment by a government agency arising from an act of a duly authorized official which binds the government to the immediate or eventual payment of a sum of money.
- 10. Any work process or group of work processes undertaken to realize the outputs and outcomes of an agency. This is represented by an item of appropriation in the national budget.
